Operation Street Smart Is Coming Back

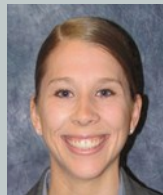

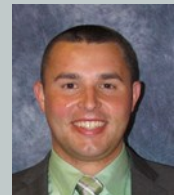

SIGNS OF A SCAM

The Ohio Attorney General's office wants you to know that "Scammers" use a variety of ways to make you think their offerings are legitimate. Here are some tips that someone may be trying to scam you:

- ◆ Ask you to wire money or purchase a prepaid money card ("Green Dot" card has been a popular means of payment by scammers)
- ◆ Pressures you to "act now"
- ◆ Tells you to send money in advance to secure or ensure a loan or grant
- ◆ Claims you've won a contest that you have not heard of or entered
- ◆ Tells you to pay a fee to receive your "prize"
- ◆ Request your personal information
- ◆ Asks for a large down payment
- ◆ Refuse to provide written information or contact information
- ◆ Asks you to send money out of the country



SCAM ALERT - IRS SCAM

As we enter into the tax season, be on guard of scammers calling to tell you that you owe back taxes and you must pay immediately or face being arrested.

Remember this about the Internal Revenue Service:

The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email, text messages or the telephone to request personal or financial information. The IRS does not ask for PINs, passwords or similar confidential access information for credit card, bank or other financial accounts.

The IRS will always send taxpayers a written notification of any tax due via the U.S. mail. For more information or to report a scam, go to www.irs.gov and type "scam" in the search box.

HOME SAFETY TIPS

The National Safety Council says carbon monoxide detectors save lives, but less than one-third of American homes have one installed. With December and January at the peak of CO poisonings, be sure to follow tips like these:

- Make sure chimneys, fireplaces and other areas are annually inspected and cleaned by a certified technician.
- Do not use ovens or gas ranges to heat your home.
- Never leave a lawn mower or car running in an enclosed space.
- Have a carbon monoxide alarm in your home. If the alarm goes off check that it is the carbon monoxide monitor, check for poisoning symptoms and clear out of area immediately if someone is experiencing symptoms. If not, thoroughly ventilate your home.

Home fires are more prevalent in the winter months than any other season. Cooking is the leading cause of all winter residential building fires, while other causes include space heaters, fireplaces and candles. Please be careful when using these devices for heating purposes. Make sure they are away from other flammable items, use in well ventilated areas and do not leave these devices unattended when they are in use.
